# Rep. Young Kim (CA-40) Voted For And Endorsed The Republican Default Bill That Threatens The Financial, Health, And Food Security Of Her Constituents, Including Over 78,000 Social Security Recipients And 24,000 Veterans

**SUMMARY**: Rep. Young Kim (CA-40) <u>voted for</u> the Republican Default Bill putting the benefits and livelihoods of thousands of her constituents, including over 78,000 Social Security recipients, 24,000 veterans, and 114,000 students. Rep. Kim endorsed the Default Bill saying it was "<u>a step forward to address our \$31 trillion national debt & get federal spending under control.</u>"

Furthermore, the Republican-led default threatens Medicare for <u>6.6 million</u> Californians and Social Security for <u>6.1 million</u>, while putting over <u>1.5 million</u> California veterans at risk. A Republican-led default would also threaten \$11.4 billion in <u>SNAP</u> and <u>TANF</u> assistance for Californians.

A Republican-led default threatens the quality of life and economic security of California's <u>5.7</u> <u>million senior citizens</u>, the largest population of seniors in the United States, with <u>84% relying on</u> <u>Social Security income</u> and <u>13% being veterans</u>.
