Rep. Bacon <u>endorsed</u> the bill, saying there were "<u>ZERO CUTS to veterans</u> <u>benefits</u>" in the bill, claiming that the bill's opponents were "<u>lying to veterans</u>."

Furthermore, a Republican-led default threatens Medicare for 368,000 Nebraskans and Social Security for 360,000, while putting 120,000 Nebraska veterans at risk. A Republican-led default would also threaten over \$310 million in SNAP and TANF assistance for Nebraskans.

Lastly, a Republican-led default threatens the quality of life and economic security of Nebraska's <u>323,000</u> senior citizens, with <u>89% relying on Social Security income</u> and <u>16% being veterans</u>.
