A Republican-led default would also threaten SNAP benefits for more than 700,000 New Jerseyans and TANF for 21,645 each month.

Lastly, a Republican-led default threatens the quality of life and economic security of New Jersey's <u>1.49 million senior citizens</u>, the 10th largest population of seniors in the United States, with <u>88% relying on Social Security income</u> and <u>10% being veterans</u>.

According To the Nonpartisan Congressional Budget Office, Republicans' Default Deal Would Impose New Work Requirements For SNAP And TANF Resulting In An Over \$11 Billion Reduction In Funding. "CBO estimates that expanding the work requirement to adults ages 50 to 55 would reduce direct spending by \$11 billion over the 2023–2033 period.
