

Rep. David Valadao (CA-22) Voted For And Endorsed The Republican Default Bill That Threatens The Financial, Health, And Food Security Of His Constituents, Including 122,000 Social Security Recipients And 17,000 Veterans

SUMMARY: Rep. David Valadao (CA-22) [voted for](#) the Republican Default Bill putting the benefits and livelihoods of thousands of his constituents, including over 122,000 Social Security recipients, 17,000 veterans, and 183,000 students at risk. Rep. Valadao [endorsed](#) the Default Bill calling it “[the first step in the negotiation process](#).”

Furthermore, the Republican-led default threatens Medicare for [6.6 million](#) Californians and Social Security for [6.1 million](#), while putting over [1.5 Million](#) California veterans at risk. A Republican-led default would also threaten \$11.4 billion in [SNAP](#) and [TANF](#) assistance for Californians.

A Republican-led default threatens the quality of life and economic security of California's [5.7 million senior citizens](#), the largest population of seniors in the United States, with [84% relying on Social Security income](#) and [13% being veterans](#).

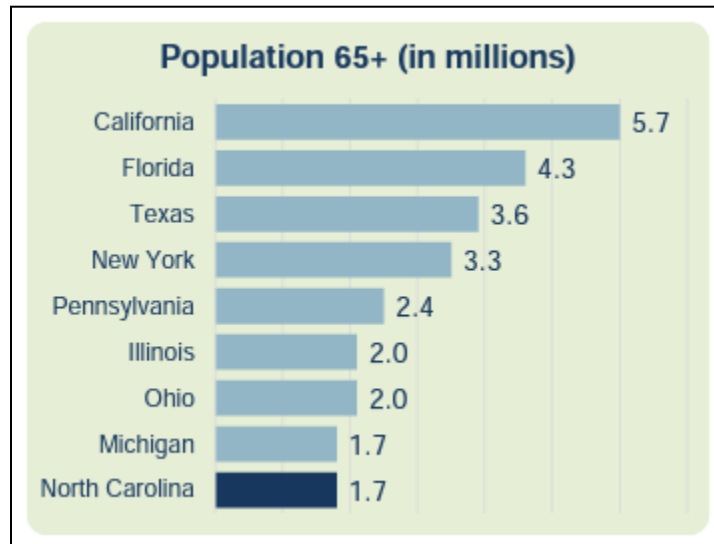
The Republicans' Default Deal Would Result In An Over \$11 Billion Cut In SNAP And TANF Funding.

According To the Nonpartisan Congressional Budget Office, Republicans' Default Deal Would Impose New Work Requirements For SNAP And TANF Resulting In An Over \$11 Billion Reduction In Funding. "CBO estimates that expanding the work requirement to adults ages 50 to 55 would reduce direct spending by \$11 billion over the 2023–2033 period. [...] CBO estimates that the resulting reduction in [TANF] block grants would reduce direct spending by \$6 million over the 2023–2033 period." [CBO, [04/25/23](#)]

As Of 2021, California Had Approximately 5.7 Million People 65 Or Older, The Highest Population In The Country, With 39% Living Alone And 33% Having A Disability.
