

Former High-Ranking Military Officials Have Spoken Out Against Hegseth's Nomination, Citing His Lack Of Qualifications And Reckless Desire To Politicize The Military

SUMMARY: Former military and defense officials have criticized Trump's nomination of Pete Hegseth for Secretary of Defense, noting his lack of qualifications and apparent willingness to politicize the military:

- Retired Major General William Enyart: "If Hegseth is confirmed, he'll be the most spectacularly unqualified person ever nominated and ever confirmed to the position."
- Eric Edelman, former Under Secretary of Defense for Policy (2005-2009): "It appears that one of the main criteria that's being used is, how well do people defend Donald Trump on television?"
- Retired Four Star General Barry McCaffrey: sexual assault allegations against Hegseth "call into guestion his judgement and suitability."
- Paul Reickhoff, Founder of Independent Veterans of America: "Hegseth is <u>undoubtedly the least qualified nominee for SecDef in American History</u>. And the most overtly political. Brace yourself, America."
- Sen.-elect Elissa Slotkin, former Acting Assistant Secretary of Defense for International Security Affairs (2015-2017): "Our military and the role of the military is in the Constitution for a reason, and I think we're really at risk of politicizing the military in a way that we can't put the genie back in the bottle."

Current and former high-ranking officials, including **outgoing Secretary of Defense Lloyd Austin** and **former Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff Mark Milley**, have <u>also criticized</u> Hegseth's claims that women should be barred from serving in combat roles in the military.

"A previously undisclosed whistle-blower report on Hegseth's tenure as the president of Concerned Veterans for America, from 2013 until 2016, describes him as being repeatedly intoxicated while acting in his official capacity—to the point of needing to be carried out of the organization's events... The report also says that Hegseth, who was married at the time, and other members of his management team sexually pursued the organization's female staffers, whom they divided into two groups—the 'party girls' and the 'not party girls.' In addition, the report asserts that, under Hegseth's leadership, the organization became a hostile workplace that ignored serious accusations of impropriety, including an allegation made by a female employee that another employee on Hegseth's staff had attempted to sexually assault her at the Louisiana strip club... according to three knowledgeable sources, one of whom contributed to the whistle-blower report, Hegseth was forced to step down from the organization in part because of concerns about his mismanagement and abuse of alcohol on the job." General Enyart served on active duty in the United States Air Force. He served as Commander, Illinois Army National Guard Forces deployed to Kiev, Ukraine in July, 2005. General Enyart was selected to brief the Polish Army and Air General Staff on mobilization policy of United States Reserve Military Forces. 
