

Trump Nominated Susan Courtwright Rodriguez, An Anti-Abortion Lawyer With A History Of Protecting Corporate Interests, To The Western District Of North Carolina

SUMMARY:

In August 2025, President Trump <u>announced</u> the nomination of Susan Courtwright Rodriguez to the Western District of North Carolina. In April 2023, Rodriguez was sworn in as a magistrate judge in the Western District of North Carolina. Previously, she was a <u>partner</u> at McGuireWoods LLP where she co-led the firm's financial institutions industry team and represented clients in government investigations.

From 2013-2021, Rodriguez served as a board member and then <u>president</u> of MiraVia, a Catholic "safe haven" that states life begins at conception and encourages pregnant women to avoid abortion. In recent years, she has <u>spoken</u> at at least two Federalist Society events and was previously a member of the Republican National Lawyers Association. Her longtime association with these conservative, anti-abortion organizations highlight her alignment with the legal effort to roll back reproductive rights.

Throughout her career, Rodriguez has sided with corporate interests accused of misconduct. As an attorney, she represented corporations accused of misconduct by the government or whistleblowers. In 2021, she represented Truist Bank after an employee sued for unlawful retaliation and wrongful termination for protected whistleblowing activities, and settled out of court. As a magistrate judge, she has continued to rule in favor of those interests.



"Judge Rodriguez was previously a partner at the law firm, McGuireWoods LLP, where she was the co-leader of the firm's financial institutions industry team. Her private practice experience focused on government investigations and white-collar matters. She has represented clients in numerous government investigations by the U.S. Department of Justice, U.S. Department of Homeland Security, Consumer Financial Protection Bureau (CFPB), and the Federal Trade Commission (FTC), among others." Rodriguez Served As A Legal Policy Advisor At The Department Of Homeland Security, Clerked For A Western District Of North Carolina Judge, And Worked On Judicial Nominations In The Bush Administration. "Before joining McGuireWoods in 2011, Susan served as a legal policy advisor at the Department of Homeland Security. Susan also served as federal law clerk for the Honorable Frank D. Whitney, U.S. District Court Judge for the Western District of North Carolina, handling both civil and criminal matters. Prior to that, she was a presidential appointee, serving as a staffer in the White House Counsel's office from 2005-2006, handling management of judicial nominations and assisting with responses to congressional investigations." MiraVia Is A "Safe Haven" For Pregnant Mothers Which Invokes A "Christ-Centered Approach," And Believes Life Starts "From The Moment Of Conception." "Respecting and affirming life from the moment of conception, MiraVia has been a safe haven and source of hope for pregnant mothers and their children since 1994. Invoking a Christ-centered approach inspired by the examples of Mary and Joseph, MiraVia helps young families move toward a new life of hopeful, independent, and healthy living and educates the broader community on the importance of fostering a culture of life." MiraVia Is A Catholic 501(c)(3) Nonprofit Organization. "MiraVia, Inc. is an accredited Catholic, 501(c)(3) non-profit corporation operating in Charlotte, North Carolina. It was incorporated as Room At The Inn, Inc. by the Secretary of State in March 1994. The organization was rebranded as MiraVia in 2013. MiraVia is a ministry of the Catholic Church and is listed in the P.J. Kenedy and Sons Official Catholic Directory. In 2023, MiraVia was accredited The Gold Seal of Approval by The Joint Commission." MiraVia Celebrated The Supreme Court's Reversal Of Roe v. Wade At A "Leading The Way To Life" Fundraiser. "It was a moment to remember when more than 1,200 joy-filled pro-life advocates rose to their feet to applaud the reversal of the Roe v. Wade Supreme Court decision during the 'Leading the Way to Life' fundraiser for MiraVia Oct. 20 at the Charlotte Convention Center. MiraVia has helped more than 11,000 women and children since 1994. 'I will always remember (June 24),' said Debbie Capen, executive director of MiraVia, during her remarks. 'I went to the chapel immediately at MiraVia and knelt in front of Our Lord (in the tabernacle) and thanked Him. So many of us said we'd never live to see the day and here it was. As A Corporate Attorney And A Magistrate Judge, Rodriguez Has Sided With Corporate Interests Accused Of Misconduct

Rodriguez Represented Truist Bank After They Were Sued For Alleged Wrongful Retaliation Against A Whistleblower And Settled Out Of Court

2021: An Employee Of Truist Bank Sued The Company For Unlawful Retaliation And Wrongful Termination For Protected Whistleblowing Activities. "Denise Whiting ('Whiting'), a former employee of Defendant, brings this complaint for unlawful retaliation and wrongful termination for protected whistleblowing activities in violation of the Sarbanes-Oxley Act of 2002 [...] On February 10, 2017, Whiting notified EVP of Financial Crimes and SVP of FIU of Financial Crimes that there were several accounts open for clients with links to human trafficking. These accounts should have already been closed or more actively monitored based on previous SARs filed between 2012 and 2015. Upon information and belief, no action was taken by EVP of Financial Crimes [...] Upon information and belief, BB&T fired Whiting for her whistleblower activities so it could continue to misrepresent to shareholders that it had an effective BSA/AML program when it, in fact, did not." The Case Was Settled Out Of Court. "I hereby report and certify that on January 31, 2022, the parties and their respective attorneys participated in a mediated settlement conference with the undersigned, the result of which was a settlement of all claims. The parties will be filing a stipulation of dismissal." [Western District of North Carolina, Whiting v. Truist Bank, Report of Mediator, filed 2/9/22]

The Case Was Dismissed. "Pursuant to Rule 41(a)(1)(A)(ii) of the Federal Rules of Civil Procedure, Plaintiff Denise Whiting and Defendant Truist Bank f/k/a Branch Banking and Trust Company, by and through the undersigned counsel, hereby stipulate to the dismissal of this action with prejudice, with each party bearing her or its own attorneys' fees and costs. This shall conclude the matter. This the 25th day of February 2022." [Western District of North Carolina, Whiting v. Truist Bank, Stipulation of Dismissal with Prejudice, filed 2/25/22]

Rodriguez Presided Over Rodriguez v. Wipro, Ruling Against A Whistleblower Who Alleged Wrongful Retaliation

A Plaintiff Alleged She Was Discriminated Against And Wrongfully Terminated After Whistleblowing Suspicious Activity By A Coworker To Her Employer. "Plaintiff brought this lawsuit under federal law alleging violations of the Sarbanes-Oxley Act ('SOX') and the Americans with Disabilities Act ('ADA'). (Amend. Comp., Doc. No. 32). Accepting the facts alleged in the Amended Complaint as true for the purposes of evaluating this Motion to Dismiss, Plaintiff Virgilia Rodriguez is a former employee of Defendant Wipro Limited. Id. 1. Defendant terminated Plaintiff's employment on June 6, 2022. Id. ¶¶ 1, 6. [...] In accordance with Defendant's 'suspicious activity' policy, Plaintiff 'reported the existence of Dauphine along with Mr. Schwab's behaviors and absenteeism' to Human Resources Manager Brittney Cammack ('Ms. Cammack'). [...] On June 6, 2022, Defendant terminated Plaintiff's employment. [...] Plaintiff further states she was 'discriminated and retaliated against. . . based upon her report of David Schwab's illicit corporation to her former supervisors.' Id. 10. Plaintiff also contends Defendant ignored her ADA protections." [Western District of North Carolina, Rodriguez v. Wipro Limited, Order, filed 9/30/24]

Rodriguez Ruled In Favor Of The Defendant, Dismissing The Plaintiff's Complaints. "Defendant's 'Motion to Dismiss Plaintiff's Amended Complaint' (Doc. No. 36) is GRANTED. Plaintiff's SOX and ADA claims are DISMISSED WITHOUT PREJUDICE. Plaintiff's claim under 18 U.S.C. § 1348 is DISMISSED WITH PREJUDICE." [Western District of North Carolina, Rodriguez v.
